

School Bus Safety Guidelines

Pupil Transportation is a vital part of the public school system. Because of the geographic features of Plum Borough, transportation is a major part of our operation. Each year our school buses travel approximately 700,000 miles. The safety of our children is our utmost concern. In addition to the school officials and parents, the children must be a part of this safety consciousness. They must follow certain guidelines to ensure their safety as well as the safety of their fellow students. For this reason, a set of rules and regulations for bus riding has been established.



- 1. Students are to be at their designated stop five minutes prior to the assigned pick-up time.
- 2. Students are to remain at the designated stop until the bus arrives. Students should wait at least ten feet from the edge of the highway at the designated stop. Boarding will take place in single file with no pushing, once the bus comes to a full stop.
- 3. When students must cross the roadway before getting on the bus, these students must wait until the bus stops and the red lights are activated. The students must also look at the bus driver, and check both lanes of traffic before crossing the roadway, during loading and unloading.
- 4. Assigned seats will be done at the beginning of the school year. Kindergarten students are usually kept in the front of the bus. Seating arrangements can be adjusted when discipline problems arise.

Plum Transportation Rules

SCHOOL OPENS AUGUST 31, 2011 DRIVE CAREFULLY

- All students must remain in their seats during the bus ride. No student is permitted to hang out the window or to throw anything out of the windows.
- 6. No student is permitted to open the emergency door, roof hatch, or window escape except upon the direction of the driver or in an emergency in which the driver is incapacitated.
- 7. Every student who rides a bus must get on and off at the bus stop assigned. Any student who wishes to ride a bus other than his regular school bus must have a written request signed by a parent and the building principal. The same request is required if the student needs to get off at a stop that is not his regular bus stop. The bus driver has the right to refuse such a request if the request results in an overload situation.
- 8. Smoking is not permitted on the school bus. Screwdrivers and other hand tools, weapons, guns, knives, water guns, bats and balls, hockey sticks, skateboards, matches, or lighters, and other items that can be a hazard or conceived as a weapon are not permitted on the bus.
- 9. No vulgar language or vulgarity of any kind shall be used on the bus or at the designated bus stop.
- 10. No eating or drinking is permitted on the bus.
- Intentional carrying of snow or ice into the bus and the snowballing of buses is not permitted.



12. Any unwarranted conduct not specifically covered in the preceding regulations but which the bus driver, the principal, or the director of transportation determines to be detrimental to the safe operation of the bus is not permitted.

Consequences for students who violate the Bus Safety Guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Verbal warning by the driver.
- 2. Conference between the driver and student. Driver informs student of consequences of further discipline problems. Seating arrangement may be altered at this time.
- 3. First Formal Write-up: The Building Principal notifies the student and the parents that there is a danger of the student losing transportation privileges.
- 4. Second Formal Write-up: The student and his/her parents are made aware that transportation privileges are suspended for an amount of time as determined by the Building Principal. Future incidents can result in a progression in the disciplinary assessments.
- 5. Third Formal Write-up: The student and parents are notified that transportation privileges for the remainder of the school year are in jeopardy. Length of suspension will be determined by the Building Principal based on his/her investigation.
- It is emphasized that riding a school bus

is a privilege. Serious types of misbehavior such as vandalism and the disregard for the safety of the bus driver and the other students may result in immediate and indefinite suspension regardless of the number of times the student has been suspended. This is based on the Building Principal's investigation and assessment.



Plum Borough School District Bus Schedule 2011-2012

The times indicated in the schedule are starting times for the buses at the first stop. Students should be at the bus stop five (5) minutes before pick-up time - no earlier. Students are not permitted to ride buses other than their assigned bus, for it could cause overloading. Overloading creates a hazard and is in violation of state law.

Parents are asked to acquaint their children with all stops, procedures, and safety rules. It might be helpful to take your children to the bus in the morning and meet the bus when it returns in the afternoon until they are familiar with the stop. If you have any questions concerning the bus schedule (stops, times, etc.) please contact the School Transportation Department at 412-795-3600. We need your cooperation to provide a safe and efficient transportation system.

Kindergarten

Kindergarten students should follow the regular scheduled bus routes listed under each elementary school. There is no midday transportation for Kindergarten students attending St. John's School during the 2011-12 school year. If you have any questions concerning Kindergarten transportation, please contact the Transportation Office.

Services for Preschool Children with Disabilities

The Early Intervention Services Act (Act 212) entitles all preschool children with disabilities to appropriate early intervention services. The Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare is responsible for providing services to infants and toddlers, defined as children from birth through two years of age. At-risk children are eligible for screening and monitoring through The Alliance for Infants and Toddlers, Inc., 412.885.6000.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education is responsible for providing services to preschool children (ages 3-5). If your child is less than age of beginners and at least 3 years of age, they are considered to have a developmental delay when difficulties exist in the areas of cognitive, communicative, physical, social/emotional and self-help development.

Special Education Services for School-Age Exceptional Students

Plum Borough School District provides a free, appropriate, public education (FAPE) to exceptional students consistent with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) of 2004 (P.L.108- 446). To qualify as an exceptional student, the child must be of school-age, in need of specially-designed instruction, and meet eligibility criteria for one or more of the following physical or mental disabilities: autism, deaf-blindness, emotional disturbance, hearing impairment including deafness, intellectual disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, visual impairment including blindness, and in the case of a child that is of pre-school age, developmental delay. Identification procedures ensure eligible students receive an appropriate program consisting of individualized special education and related services. At no cost to the parents, these services are provided in compliance with state and federal law and planned to ensure meaningful educational benefit and student progress.

To identify students who may be eligible for special education, various screening activities are conducted on an ongoing basis. These screening activities may include: hearing,

vision, physical and speech/language screening; a review of group-based data (cumulative academic records, ability and achievement test scores, enrollment records, report cards, and health records); and a review by the building-level team. When screening results suggest that a student may need special education services, PBSD will, with parental consent, conduct an evaluation. Parents who suspect their child may need special education services may also submit a written request for an evaluation to the school principal. Services designed to meet the needs of exceptional students include: a timely evaluation and the annual development of an Individualized Education Program (IEP). Parents are an integral part of the IEP process and should be present at IEP meetings. Plum Borough School District will make every effort to ensure parent participation.

The extent of special education services and the location for the delivery of those services are determined by the IEP team and based on student's identified needs and abilities. Consideration also is given to the student's chronological age and level of intensity of the specified intervention. The district provides supplementary aids and services, such as transportation, physical therapy and occupational therapy, as necessary for the student to benefit from the special education program. Parents may obtain additional information about special education services and programs and parental due process rights by contacting the child's school principal or the Special Education Office at 412.798.6393.

Exceptional Students in Non-Public Schools

Plum Borough School District's special education programs and services are accessible to resident students attending nonpublic schools. Special education programs are made accessible to non-public school students through dual-enrollment following evaluation and development of an Individualized Education Program (IEP). Parents of nonpublic school students who suspect that their child has a disability and is in need of special education may request a multidisciplinary team evaluation of their child through a written request to the district's Special Education Office at 412.798.6393.

Chapter 15: Services for Protected Handicapped Students

In compliance with state and federal law, the Plum Borough School District provides services or accommodations to protected handicapped students. These services ensure equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extracurricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. They are provided without discrimination or cost to the student or family. To qualify for services as a "Protected Handicapped Student," the child must be of school age and have a physical or mental disability which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. Additional information on evaluation procedures and services for protected handicapped students can be obtained from the child's school principal or the Special Education Office at 412.798.6393.

Release of Information Policy

According to the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), non-confidential information about students may be included in publications such as sports programs, newspapers, radio and television news reports, newsletters, award and graduation programs, yearbooks, musical and play programs and other school publications. This information may include the student's name, address, study interests, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weights and heights of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees, awards received and other similar information. Parents who wish to exempt their children from the release of such information should do so in writing to the principal.

Students Records

The District's policy on student records guarantees that parents and eligible students shall have the right to review and obtain a copy of the record; challenge its contents; refuse individual consent where permission is needed for releasing certain information; and file complaints with the:

Family Policy Compliance Office U.S. Department of Education 400 Maryland Avenue S.W. Washington DC 20202.

This policy is in compliance with the Pennsylvania State Board of Education's regulations and with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. If a child transfers to another school system, the District will forward the record when a parent-initiated written request is sent from the new school.



Homeless Students

The board recognizes its obligations to ensure that homeless students have access to the same educational programs and services provided to other district students. The board shall make reasonable efforts to identify homeless children within the district, encourage their enrollment, and eliminate existing barriers to their attendance and education, in compliance with federal and state laws and regulations.



Entrance Requirements

According to Pennsylvania State Law, the admission of beginners to the public schools shall be confined to the first two weeks of the annual school term in districts operating on an annual promotion basis.

Children entering first grade must be 6 years of age on or before September 1 of the school year.

Children entering kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before September 1 of the school year. No early entrance of children to the kindergarten program or the first grade will be permitted.

Drug-Free Workplace

The Federal Drug-Free Workplace Act requires schools to be free of the illegal use of drugs and requires the district to issue the following statement to all: "No one is allowed to use, make, sell, distribute, or have in their possession any illegal drugs.

Unlawful Harassment

The school board strives to provide a safe, positive learning climate for students in the schools. It is the policy of the district to maintain an educational environment in which harassment in any form is not tolerated. The board prohibits all forms of unlawful harassment of students and employees by all district students and staff members, contracted individuals and vendors, and volunteers in the schools. Students and employees should be aware of the policy and adhere to it. Violations of this policy should be immediately reported to the building principal. This policy is available in the guidance office or administrative office.

Non-discrimination in School and Classroom

The board declares it to be the policy of this district to provide an equal opportunity for all students to achieve their maximum potential through the programs offered in the schools regardless of race, color, age, creed, religion, gender, sexual orientation, ancestry, national origin, or handicap/disability. The board shall provide to all students, without discrimination, course offerings, counseling assistance, employment, athletics, and extracurricular activities. The district shall make reasonable accommodations for students identified with physical and mental impairments that constitute disabilities, consistent with the requirements of federal and state laws and regulations. This policy is available in the Central Administration Office.

If any individual requires special accommodations, contact the building principal three days prior to the scheduled event in order that accommodations can be secured.

Board members are elected by residents of Plum Borough for a four-year term of office.

Whenever the administration develops a proposal (whether by its own initiative or as directed by the school board), it is presented to the appropriate board committee, e.g. education, athletics, transportation, etc. for discussion and evaluation. Once the proposal has been heard, the board committee then decides whether to pursue more research or recommend the proposal for a board vote.

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Teachers Learn Even After School's Out

The Plum Borough School District offered three separate days of technology professional development opportunities for staff members this summer.

- The district has adopted Microsoft's Cloud Computing Solution for students and staff. Teachers and administrators learned how to access live@edu from any internet connection. Email, setting up classroom groups, using online applications such as Word, Excel, and Power Point, uploading files to the cloud and sharing files were some of the topics covered during this training.
- 2. Moodle has been selected as the online learning tool for the district and was the focus of the second day of training. Even though many of our teachers have been and continue to use Moodle, the district offered a Level 1 and a Level 2 training for all teachers. Teachers learned how to setup and manage a Moodle page, insert pictures and add resources in the Level 1 course. Level 2 consisted of using forums, journals, digital submissions where students will be able to turn in assignments electronically and online testing.
- 3. The third training provided teachers with knowledge and expertise using Interactive White Boards. Introductory concepts such as setting up the boards, using interactive tools such as the camera and toolbar, as well as more advanced skills including inserting videos, assessments and quizzes were taught.



Title I Services

Title I is a federally funded supplemental reading and math program. Supplemental reading instruction is available to all students in grades K through 6 who demonstrate a need for this instruction. Supplemental



math instruction is also available to students demonstrating a need in grades 5 and 6. Candidates for the program are identified through assessments and teacher observations. The Title I teachers are certified reading specialists who work closely with classroom teachers to develop appropriate interventions.

The purpose of the program is to provide additional instruction and practice in all facets of the reading process. Students in grades K - 4 are taught in educational environments that best meet their needs. Supplementary instruction may occur in small flexible groups that meet three to five times per week, one-on-one sessions, or in the whole class setting. Students in grades 5 - 6 receive instruction

through the Academy of Reading and Academy of Math computer programs with teacher intervention as needed. Parents are kept informed of their children's progress through progress reports, assessment reports, and parent conferences. Parents are also informed about the Title I Program through parent workshops, take-home information, the district website, and planning meetings.

All parents of Title I students have the opportunity to be involved in federal programs planning. At the spring meeting plans for the upcoming school year are discussed and parents can provide input into how

federal funds will be used in the district's Title I and Title II projects. Parents are asked to review and assist in designing strategies for increasing parental involvement. Parents are also encouraged to partner with teachers by volunteering in their child's school and practicing reading with their children at home. Parents are



also invited to attend workshops with their children to learn techniques to support their children in reading at home.

Regency Park Elementary School is in the process of qualifying as a *Schoolwide Title I* building. This means that all students are considered Title I students and all teachers are Title I teachers. This allows more flexibility in use of teachers' instructional time to meet the needs of students and in the use of federal funds. This status is being considered based on the percentage of low income students and the building's year long planning process on how best to improve student achievement, even though Regency Park has achieved adequate yearly progress every year.

The school wide project functions as part of the building's Response to Instruction and Intervention Model. Instruction is part of the regular education program and may take place in the regular classroom or in the Title I classroom. Title I instruction may be with the reading specialist or the classroom teacher working in partnership. Since all students are now eligible for Title I services, it is no longer necessary to identify individual students as receiving Title I services. However, parents are informed of their children's progress through the electronic parent portal to monitor their children's grades in real time. This will continue to be available to all parents. Those who do not have internet access can request

hard copies of the information on a regular basis. The Title I



reading specialist and the school-based intervention teacher will participate with classroom teachers in individual parent conferences for Tier II students in the fall and spring. Parents will be provided with the results of Tier II assessments electronically and/or in written form once each grading period. Parents will also have access to their children's teacher's Moodle pages for classroom

assignments, rubrics, expectations, and communication. This is available on a daily basis. Communication of individual progress will also be evaluated through parent surveys.

THE SLEEP CONNECTION BY PAMELA PALONGUE TO Aging

hances are, if you're over the age of 40 and have trouble sleeping, one of your sage friends has informed you that after a certain age, you don't need as much sleep. Not true, says the National Sleep Foundation. Our body's need for sleep remains pretty much constant throughout the life cycle. Sleep is the way our bodies repair themselves. When our respiratory, cardiovascular, mental and physical systems shut down for the night with minimal activity, our bodies are busy at work repairing the damage done by stress, inflammation and toxins that have invaded during daylight hours. If the heart rate or mental functions are still engaged in activity, the body cannot wholly devote itself to repair. Over time this can contribute to heart disease, diabetes and other ailments.

What does change as we age are our sleep patterns. It may take longer to fall asleep or you may have noticed that you have trouble staying asleep.

About 44% of older Americans have some form or insomnia. Much of the time it can be attributed to medications which either interrupt sleep or prevent deep sleep known as REM. If insomnia is caused by medication, it is well worth a trip to the doctor to discuss other alternative medications.

Another contributor to loss of sleep as we age is snoring. Snoring is more prevalent in those who are overweight and unfortunately aging is often accompanied by weight gain. Losing weight may help alleviate some of the interruption of snoring. Loud snoring should be evaluated by a doctor since it may be a sign of a condition called sleep apnea. This is where the individual actually stops breathing for brief intervals, (usually a few seconds). In addition to preventing deep, healthy sleep it can also be potentially fatal.

Acid reflux may also be the cause of sleepless nights. The strong digestive acid from the stomach flows back into the throat causing a burning sensation and awakening. This condition also warrants a trip to the doctor to rule out more serious conditions. While there are medications available to neutralize the stomach acid, the condition is also helped by eating earlier in the evening, giving the body more time to digest the food. Also, drinking more water will aid in digestion as well.

If none of these problems seem to be the cause of sleeplessness, exercise or other physical activity may help you to enjoy a more sound sleep. Also avoiding caffeine and alcohol in the later evening hours will allow your body to relax before bedtime. More sedentary activities for an hour or so before bedtime such as reading a book, will also calm you down prior to sleep. Watching suspenseful action pictures or sporting events may raise your level of alertness so that more time is required to fall asleep.

If you find that none of the suggestions or treatments prescribed by your doctor work, a visit to a sleep disorder clinic may be in order. Sleep is important to your overall health and well-being.

Plum has a very rich coal mining history.

One would be hard-pressed to find someone in the borough who is not connected to the mines in some way, if not directly through having worked in one, then certainly indirectly through a relative who worked in one. There were four coal mines in Plum – Unity, which operated from 1872 to 1920; Logan's Ferry, which operated from 1919 to 1968; Barking, which operated from 1917 to





1979; and Renton, the last mine in Plum, which operated from 1916 to 1987.

Mining was such an important part of the fabric of the community that some felt that heritage and those who were directly a part of it needed to be honored. So six years ago, a committee was formed to raise money and create a fitting memorial to the coal miners of Plum. Through State Rep. Tony DeLuca, the project obtained a grant. Mayor Richard Hrivnak is one of the people on the committee. "I grew up in a coal mining town (Renton), so I have a special place in my heart for the men and women that worked in the mines," Hrivnak said. "Everyone is very appreciative and said it was long overdue we recognized these folks." And those folks are recognized in a memorial in front of the borough building that will do until a final memorial is constructed. The current memorial is a stone foundation with a coal car and plaque commemorating the major mines that operated in Plum. Hrivnak said his grandfather, uncles and neighbors worked in the mines. The committee has an artist

rendering for a different memorial which was designed by Plum residents Paul Bell, a draftsman, and Dan Schultz, a graphic designer, to resemble a mine shaft. "We were thinking about how in the old mines they used a lot of beams to support the walls when they were down there. That was the inspiration for it," Schultz said in explaining the design.

Schultz's father, Ronald, was a miner. "My whole family was in the coal mine," said Ronald Schultz, who worked in Renton. His father worked in Renton also, while his grandfather worked in the Logan's Ferry mine. Schultz, 72, said he liked working in the mines because it was never too hot or cold. "It was always the same temperature," he said. "I just liked it." When Renton shut down, Schultz went into construction. He said a memorial for coal miners is a good thing. "I'd like to see it get done," he said. Asked if he thinks the current generation knows enough about the mining heritage, Schultz replied, "Well, not really, not enough. It was a hard way to make a living. I don't think other people really understood what you had to go through to make a living in a coal mine."

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

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
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BOWLING Benefit for Dan Hahn



Richard Nesbit never met Cranberry police officer Dan Hahn.

But he knows Hahn's father and he knows the injured police officer is originally from Plum, a 1981 graduate of Plum High School.

That's all he needed to know to put together a fundraiser for Hahn, who is recovering from injuries to

his back, sternum, elbow, arm, ribs, shoulder and spinal cord sustained in February when he was trying to apprehend a suspect and fell 22 feet to the ground.

Hahn has worked 30 years as a police officer, 22 of them on the Cranberry police force.

"We're just trying to help him with some of the miscellaneous expenses," said Nesbit, who has corresponded with Hahn by phone and email. "We've gotten a lot of



positive response." Among the organizations pitching in are the Knights of Columbus; the Plum Chamber, which is getting the word out by distributing fliers and sending email notices; and Nesbit's church, Plum Creek Presbyterian, which is putting information about the event in its bulletin.

Nesbit said he got the idea for a fundraiser for Hahn after he and his wife watched a television news report about other events that were being held to help the officer and his family. "From what I've seen on the news, there are a lot of organizations stepping up to help," Nesbit said. "We just want to be part of the good will towards him."

Juliann Sheldon may have entered the Miss Pennsylvania contest with the attitude of just wanting to have fun and learn, but she came out with the crown.

"I think that outlook on the experience paid off," said the 21year-old, who was crowned Miss Pennsylvania June 17 at the Syria Shrine in Cheswick, Pa. The Plum native will now go on to represent her home state in the Miss America Pageant in January. Some women go for years without winning the state crown; however Sheldon, who entered her first pageant in December 2010, won it on her first try. She said she had never considered entering pageants before. "I saw what the program had to offer and what the women got out of the experience, and I knew I wanted that for myself," Sheldon explained.

Along with her Miss Pennsylvania title, Sheldon received a \$7,000 scholarship to continue her education at Point Park University where she is majoring in advertising and public relations. She is also traveling throughout the state, making public appearances and speaking on her personal platform "Mental Health Awareness."

"As a child, I struggled a lot with an anxiety problem, which hindered me with going for my goals," Sheldon said. "I want to teach others to seek help if they're having mental health issues so it doesn't hinder them." She said the difference between the anxiety she suffered as a child and what may be considered regular jitters or nerves is that her anxiety affected her everyday life. Her parents noticed that and sought help for her. She never went on medication, she said. Instead, she underwent therapy, learning to communicate and she began doing yoga. "I try and practice it as much as I possibly can." Asked if there is still a stigma associated with mental illness, she



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replied, "Absolutely, and that's one of my goals to help break that stigma by sharing my story and encouraging others to be educated as well."

To become eligible for Miss Pennsylvania, a young woman must first win a qualifying local pageant. Sheldon went through her first pageant and the second, finally winning her third, Miss Jewel of the West. That win qualified her for the Miss Pennsylvania Scholarship Pageant. She said her parents, Jeff and Jayne Sheldon, didn't know too much about the world of pageants, but once they looked into everything and attended a couple of pageants, they were extremely supportive. They just wanted to make sure she would be okay, she explained. She has one sibling, an 18-year-old brother named Drew, who will be attending the University of Pittsburgh in the fall.

Now, in between public appearances and interviews, Sheldon is preparing for Miss America. "A lot really goes into it and the board of directors really guides me through my training for Miss America." That preparation includes physical training to be ready for the swimsuit portion of the pageant.

When speaking about the swimsuit portion of the contest, the inevitable question arises about why a swimsuit needs to be part of what is called a scholarship pageant. Sheldon said that being able to wear a bikini gives a contestant confidence because of the physical training needed to look attractive in one.
